

FROM WILLIAM NAUNTON

It has been a privilege for me to be chair of Charterhouse in Southwark, since it merged with the Endowment Fund of the same name in 2010 and I am delighted to be handing over to George Hankey (L'99), as the new chair, and to know that CiS will be in such good hands. I will be remaining on the Board and will be pleased to support George as he takes CiS on the next stage of its journey.

When I took on the role from Armel Cates and Angus Lloyd, I had some big shoes to fill and I have been very lucky to have had tremendous support from a superb board of fellow trustees, including the current headmaster, Alex Peterken and the current Master of Charterhouse, Ann Kenrick, and their respective predecessors.

The Board is otherwise made up exclusively of OCs and we currently number 7. We have just said farewell to Sebastian Lyon (B'85) as one of our longest serving trustees. Sebastian has been a source of great support and wisdom to the Board and I would like to extend my thanks to him for everything that he has done for the charity throughout his long involvement with it, over more than two decades.

Since our conversion to a grant making charity in 2010, we have seen a doubling in the value of the investments held by CiS, whilst having also increased the level of financial support we provide to the Southwark community. In 2010 we gave grants to the value of £50,000, across five projects. By last year, this had grown to grants in excess of £100,000 across 16 projects. The needs of the Borough continue to increase and Bermondsey (where we predominantly operate) remains one of the most deprived parts of the UK.

I would like to thank all of you who have supported us during this time. Whilst we have not run a high profile fundraising campaign for some years, we are nonetheless grateful for the generosity of so many of you who have donated (and continue to donate) whether by way of raising sponsorship from running the marathon, giving by way of a monthly standing order or through one-off donations (and legacies). A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

This year we have seen young people of Southwark face real challenges to their lives and futures. The pandemic has exposed the inequalities in our society and raised a greater awareness of the disproportionate experience in education. In truth, efforts to close the achievement gap between poorer pupils and their more privileged peers were already stalling before the pandemic (DofE 2019) so now more than ever it is critical that organisations such as CiS are there to help. The commitment from the voluntary youth sector has been extraordinary in how they helped with the challenges children faced. Whilst continuing to run their funded projects, charities became food distribution hubs, delivered hot meals, and supplied much needed laptops to students. The spirit of community, demonstrated throughout this crisis has been inspiring but it is critical that it continues as we head towards the next year.

PEMBROKE HOUSE

CiS funding has been supporting children at Pembroke House who would otherwise miss out because of where they live, who they are, or what they are going through, to transition to secondary school through the Pembroke Academy of Music (PAM). Alongside weekly term-time professional tuition in a musical instrument, the children also receive the right support to access opportunities that complement their education.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The start of the year saw the split of the management of our investments, with around one quarter of funds transferred to another fund management firm. This second fund management firm has, so far, performed in line with expectations. The end of the year was marked by Covid-19, and from a finance point of view meant turbulence in financial markets. The defensive investment strategies of both fund management firms has meant the value of Charity funds have not been adversely impacted, to date. We remain very grateful for the support from regular donors; this income provides the Charity with an element of financial certainty. Charterhouse in Southwark again awarded grants totalling over £100,000 in 2019/20. These were made to 16 different organisations and ranged from £1,000 to £16,604.
